5 iconodiagnostics and 1 pseudo-diagnosis have been identified among the permanent collection on paintings and sculptures (Figure 1, Table 1). The pseudo-diagnosis corresponds to craniofacial dysmorphism in an icon. As this anatomical anomaly is found on all the people represented on this icon, we can conclude that it is clearly due to the painter's style.

NEED TO KNOW about Art History

Medicine, art history : It's all in the observation!

- What do the 17th-century physician and the 20th-century art critic have in common?
- Between the Dutch genre painter and the provocative American press illustrator?
- Medical semiology or analysis of a painter's palette and touch?
- Diagnosis or attributing a work to an artist?
- You have to look, mobilize your knowledge, make comparisons and come up with hypotheses... an approach similar to the basis of iconodiagnostics!



Normann Rockwell (1894-1978)

Considered America's most popular artist, left a humorous record of twentieth-century American life through his magazine covers. Long scorned by art critics, he is now recognized as one of the post-modern realist painters. The multiple references in this painting are a tribute to the paintings of Rubens for the portrait and Frans Hals for the canvas on the right, but the amused looks of the protagonists complete the ridicule of the critic obsessed by a detail and unaware of the vitality of the models.

Gerritt Dou (1613-1675)

Studied with Rembrandt in Amsterdam, then moved to Leiden and developed a flourishing studio. Famous for his genre scenes, he emphasizes the figures through the use of chiaroscuro and adopts a tight framing with an architectural foreground. His fine, light brushstrokes leave an impression of refinement, in contrast to Frans Hals' vigorous, thick brushstrokes.

The theme of the medical consultation is often found in the genre scenes of 17th-century Dutch painters. The brightly-colored clothes and framing evoke a quackery scene, and suggest a double reading of the subject: an interior scene and a critique of doctors.

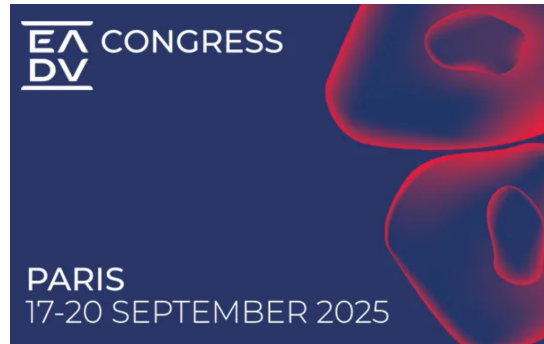

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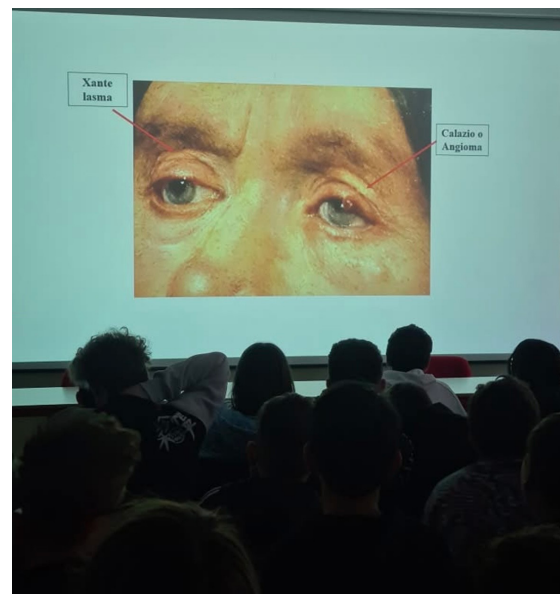


Dialogue between medical science and the arts at FESTIVAL OF ART HISTORY in FRANCE by Brigitte Hillion

Following the exemplary collaboration between the **International Society of Iconodiagnosis (ISI)** and the **Fécamp Museum**, which led to the publication of two articles featuring five iconodiagnostic case studies, the interdisciplinary momentum continues with a new highlight.

As part of the **Festival of Art History in Fontainebleau**, taking place from **June 3 to 6, 2025**, a **conference dedicated to iconodiagnosis** will be held, bringing together art historians, medical professionals, and researchers around this unique approach that blends clinical insight with iconographic analysis.

This event will not only showcase the richness of **dialogue between medical science and the arts**, but also demonstrate the potential of iconodiagnosis to shed new light on works of art. It is a wonderful opportunity to illustrate how medicine, when applied to the history of art, can

On April 15, 2025, a lesson on Iconodiagnostics was held for the students of the **"Graziadio Ascoli" middle school in Gorizia (Italy)**. The lesson was part of the project **"Sick of Art: Iconodiagnosis at School,"** organized by the International Society of Iconodiagnosis (ISI).

The aim was to **introduce the students to iconodiagnosis and, more generally, to bring them closer to Art, and stimulating critical thinking**. Observing an artwork requires time and attention and has to be done carefully in order to notice every detail and understand its true meaning.

After an initial introduction on iconodiagnosis and on the strict relationship between art and medicine, several paintings representing pathological elements were presented, and the students were asked to identify them.

Moreover, the importance of knowing the artists' medical history to better understand their work was also emphasized.

Let's hope the atmosphere at ISI remains more peaceful than in these caricatures!



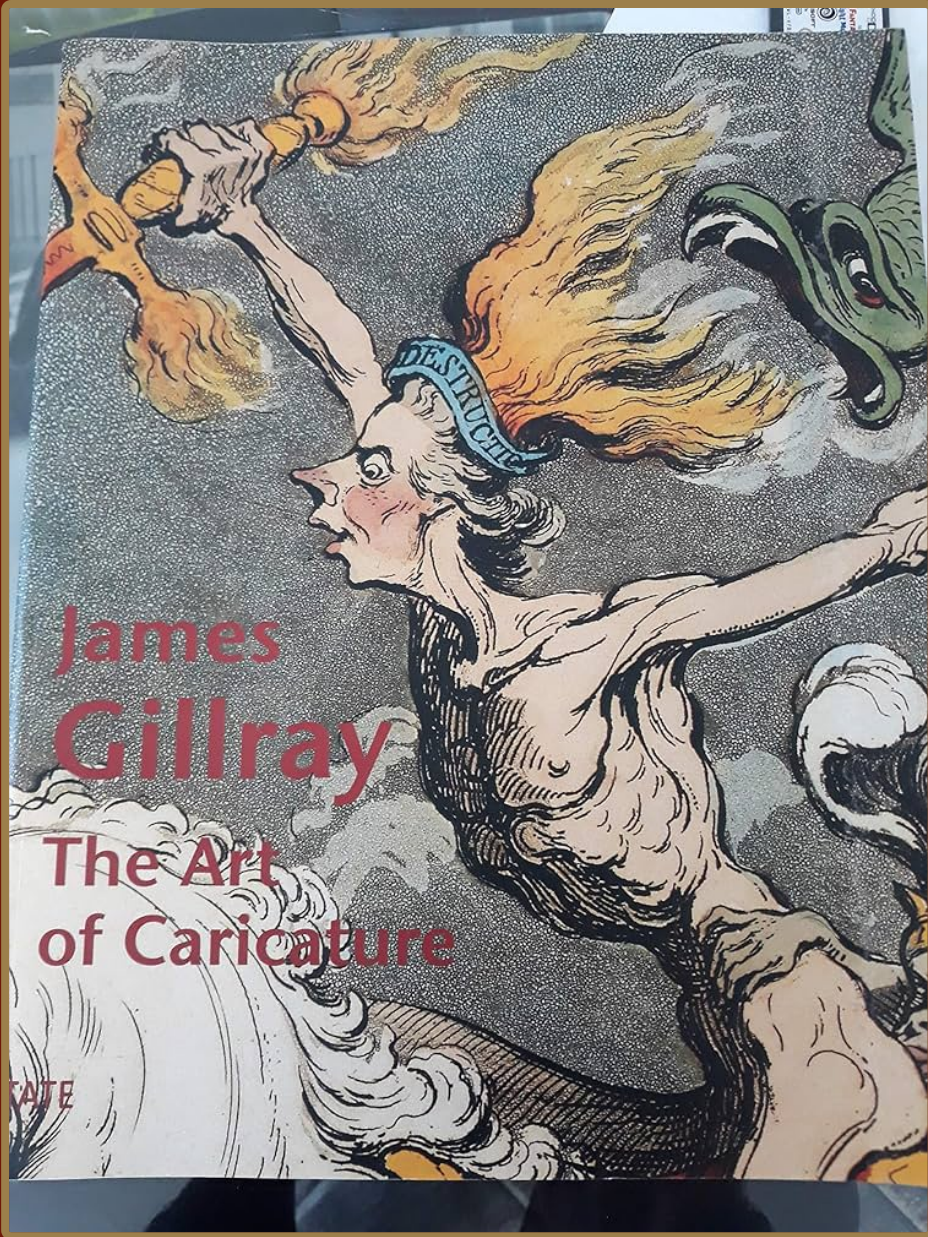
Louis-Léopold Boilly (1761–1845)

Louis-Léopold Boilly (1761–1845) was a French artist who specialized in small portraits and finely executed trompe-l'oeil works. He enjoyed inserting himself among the characters in his paintings and created many playful self-portraits.

He also became known for his caricatures, collected in a series of lithographs titled *Les Grimaces*, in which he mocked his contemporaries.

Here, the debates seem just as passionate among physicians as they are among art enthusiasts.

James Gillray (1756–1815)

James Gillray (1756–1815), a British caricaturist and engraver influenced by William Hogarth, became especially well known for his political cartoons.

In this piece, he pokes fun at a group of experts admiring a collection of paintings by George Morland (1763–1804), an artist portrayed here as a peasant, known for his rustic scenes.

The intensely focused, serious, and pretentious expressions of the experts starkly contrast with the simplicity and pastoral nature of the pig-themed paintings.

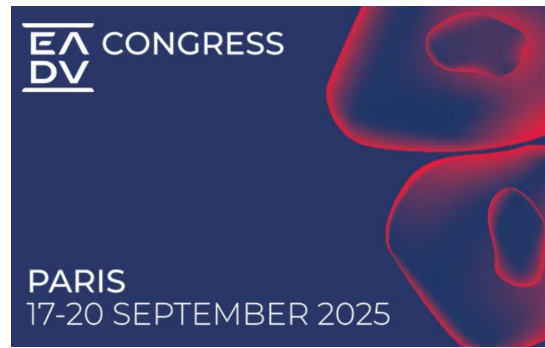

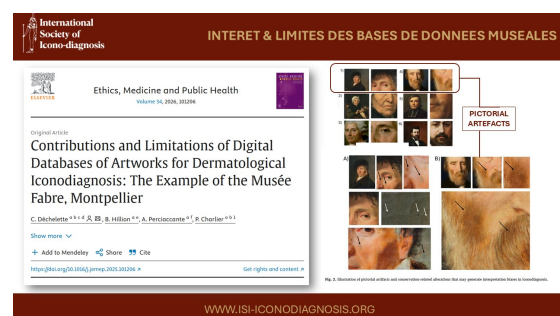

“Contributions and Limitations of Digital Art Databases for Dermatological Iconodiagnosis”

This article presents the results of work conducted with the #Musée_Fabre team in #Montpellier on a corpus of paintings from the museum's digitized database, compiled using a

#visual #semiological elements associated with pathologies. It is not limited to dermatology but extends to all medical disciplines with cutaneous and/or visible signs on the skin, such as #Horton's disease.

#ISI is launching a series of systematic reviews organized by type of iconodiagnosis to compile data enabling #semi-quantitative analysis. In accordance with #PRISMA_2020 guidelines, we have developed a protocol for a #systematic_review, including predefined eligibility criteria and a structured data extraction strategy.

Here is the first review dedicated to #Horton's disease in #Phlebology.

methodology inspired by #PRISMA guidelines.

Our #hypothesis: to identify and analyze online artworks that could reveal historical dermatological diagnoses. A total of #169 digitized portraits were analyzed, of which #6 were subject to iconodiagnostic hypotheses. This was followed by on-site examination at the Musée Fabre, including direct visual inspection of the paintings and in-depth consultation of the artwork files in the documentation department.

#Results: only 4 dermatological iconodiagnoses were confirmed. Two initial hypotheses were discarded as they were attributed to #pictorial_artifacts or alterations related to the conservation state of the works. (Thanks to my undergraduate #ArtHistory courses!!!)

Mannerism – A Risk of Overdiagnosis in Iconodiagnosis

- Mannerism is an artistic movement that emerged in early 16th-century Italy, as a reaction against the aesthetic standards of the Renaissance inspired by ancient sculpture. Perfect proportions and mathematically constructed perspectives were rejected by young artists who took inspiration from Michelangelo's later works and the twisting movements he gave to bodies. What matters above all is the "*maniera*"—the artist's personal manner of painting, meaning the creative freedom that breaks away from established norms.

- Understanding this artistic period helps prevent excessive diagnoses!



Jacopo PONTORMO 1526

In his *Deposition*, Pontormo eliminates all architectural elements; the intertwined movements of the figures form a spiral that seems to rise toward the heavens. The use of bright, acidic, contrasting colors is characteristic of this period.

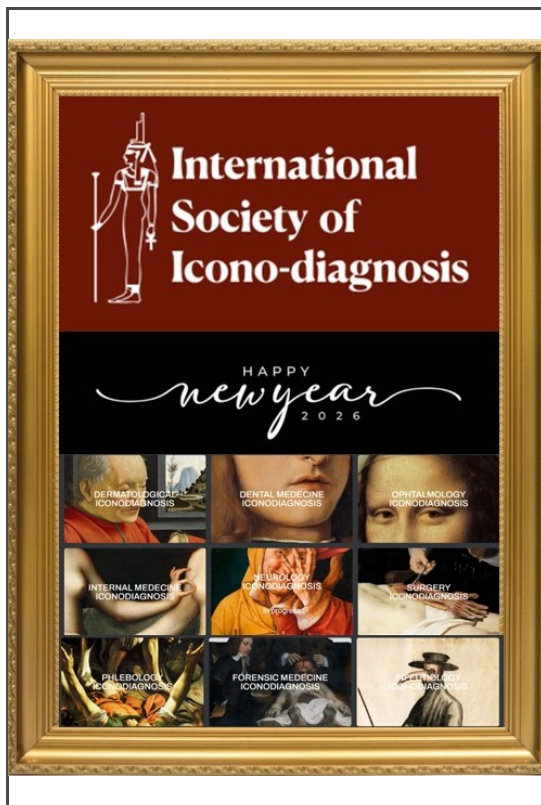
Detail of the 'The Seven works of Mercy' painted in 1504 in The Netherlands. We see a disabled man sitting on the street with stretched knees and hand crutches. His feet are rotated inwards while his left foot is depicted with seven toes. The foot deformity is compatible with (untreated) congenital clubfoot (*talipes equinovarus*) while the two extra toes (*polydactyly*) suggest a rare underlying genetic syndrome such as PITX1 gene mutation or trisomy 13 (Patau Syndrome). Isn't it fascinating that this rare combination of anomalies was captured by an artist in the early 16th century!

ANTHROPOLOGIE

Le respect de la pudeur dans l'iconographie médicale a grandement évolué depuis le XIX^e siècle. Peu à peu, l'anonymat et le consentement des patients pour l'utilisation de leur photographie dans les publications scientifiques se généralisent. Au XX^e siècle, la visibilité du corps humain est radicalement différente de celle admise au XIX^e siècle. L'anthropologie comparative de la décence et de la pudeur dans les publications biomédicales depuis deux siècles permet de se questionner et d'améliorer les comportements en visant une meilleure humanisation.

Pudeur et publications scientifiques

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Récemment, j'ai pris l'occasion pour assister à la soutenance d'une thèse d'histoire de l'art sur les illustrations scientifiques du corps humain au XIX^e siècle européen. Pendant que je feuilletais le volume d'environ 300 pages, mon voisin, un homme d'une cinquantaine d'années, s'est d'abord effrayé que je regarde en public certains clichés de corps masculins (portant sans ceinture gilet et culottes) porteurs de lésions syphilitiques avancées. Puis, quelques pages (et minutes) plus loin, quand il s'est agi d'un cliché torse nu d'une jeune femme avec une dermatose (p), ses propos ont été radicalement inversés et... particulièrement laudatifs.

Ce cas (amontable) illustre la tension palpable que véhiculent encore ces clichés (non plus de 1900 ans). Certains, comme le cliché présenté ici, sont bâtis comme de véritables œuvres d'art, reproduisant (ici avec une patiente) la pose d'une madone italienne ou, ailleurs, la naissance de Vénus par Botticelli avec un machisme sévère. Comme le rappelle Axel Holmbeck, « la tentation de l'interprétation est fonctionnelle : le mobilier, la nudité totale ou partielle, les draps et ceintures d'hôpital, les vêtements de ville, les accessoires (colliers, bijoux, coiffes), la posture, l'âge, le sexe, le regard frontal ou détourné, le cadrage serré ou non, les effets de flou, tous ces

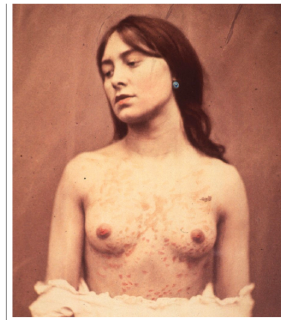


Figure 1. Femme atteinte de « végétale parasite disease of the body » (dans Alessandro Baldassarre Squire, Photographs (colored from life) of the diseases of the skin, 1868).

MODESTY and SCIENTIFIC PUBLICATIONS by Philippe Charlier

Respect for modesty in medical imagery has evolved significantly since the 19th century. Gradually, patient anonymity and consent for the use of their photographs in scientific publications have become standard practice. In the 21st century, the visibility of the human body is radically different from what was acceptable in the 19th century. A comparative anthropology of decency and modesty in biomedical publications over the past two centuries allows us to reflect on and improve practices, aiming for greater humanization.

ISI MOBILE APPLICATION

- **A mobile application serving collaborative iconodiagnostic**

The International Society of Iconodiagnostic (ISI) has developed a mobile application dedicated to exchanges between its members, with the aim of advancing iconodiagnostic in a collaborative, rigorous, and international manner.

The application is intentionally simple and intuitive to use. It allows any ISI member to contribute directly from a museum or exhibition venue.

How does it work in practice?

When you are facing a work of art presenting a potential medical anomaly (formal sign, morphology, posture, expression, etc.):

- You take a photograph of the artwork.
- You photograph the label or the information associated with the work.
- You complete a free-text field including your personal observations, iconodiagnostic hypotheses, and differential diagnoses.
- You publish the case within the ISI members' community.

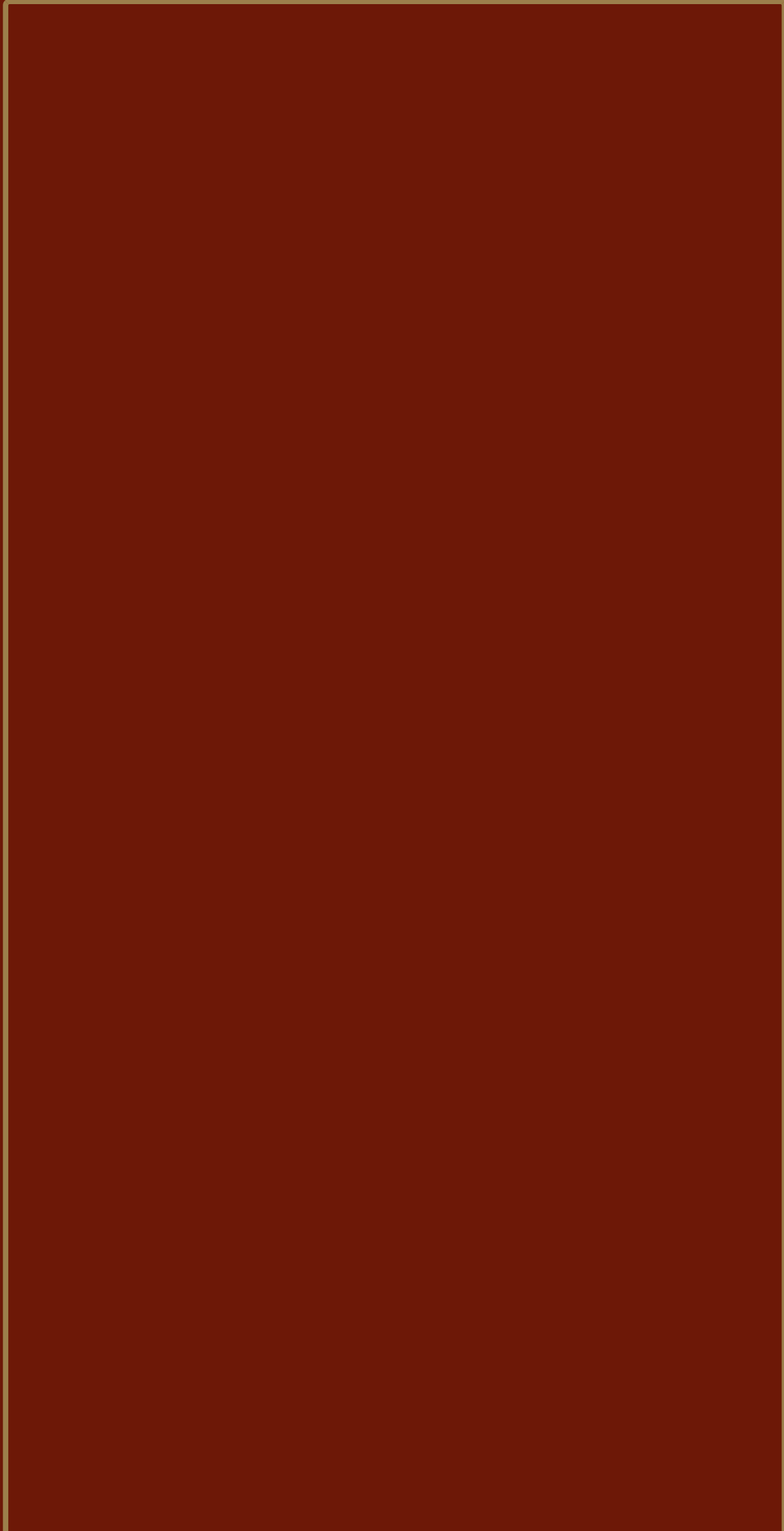
What happens next?

The case is then discussed by members of the various ISI specialty boards (dermatology, neurology, internal medicine, and other relevant disciplines). These multidisciplinary exchanges make it possible to refine the analysis and to compare hypotheses.

At the end of this collective process, a well-argued and robust iconodiagnosis is established. The case may then be integrated into the ISI database and potentially lead to a scientific publication, thereby contributing to the advancement of knowledge in iconodiagnostic.

This application fully embodies the mission of the ISI:

- to cross perspectives,
- to structure observations,
- and to transform the analysis of works of art into a genuine tool for medical and scientific research.

dynamic only through the participation of all members.

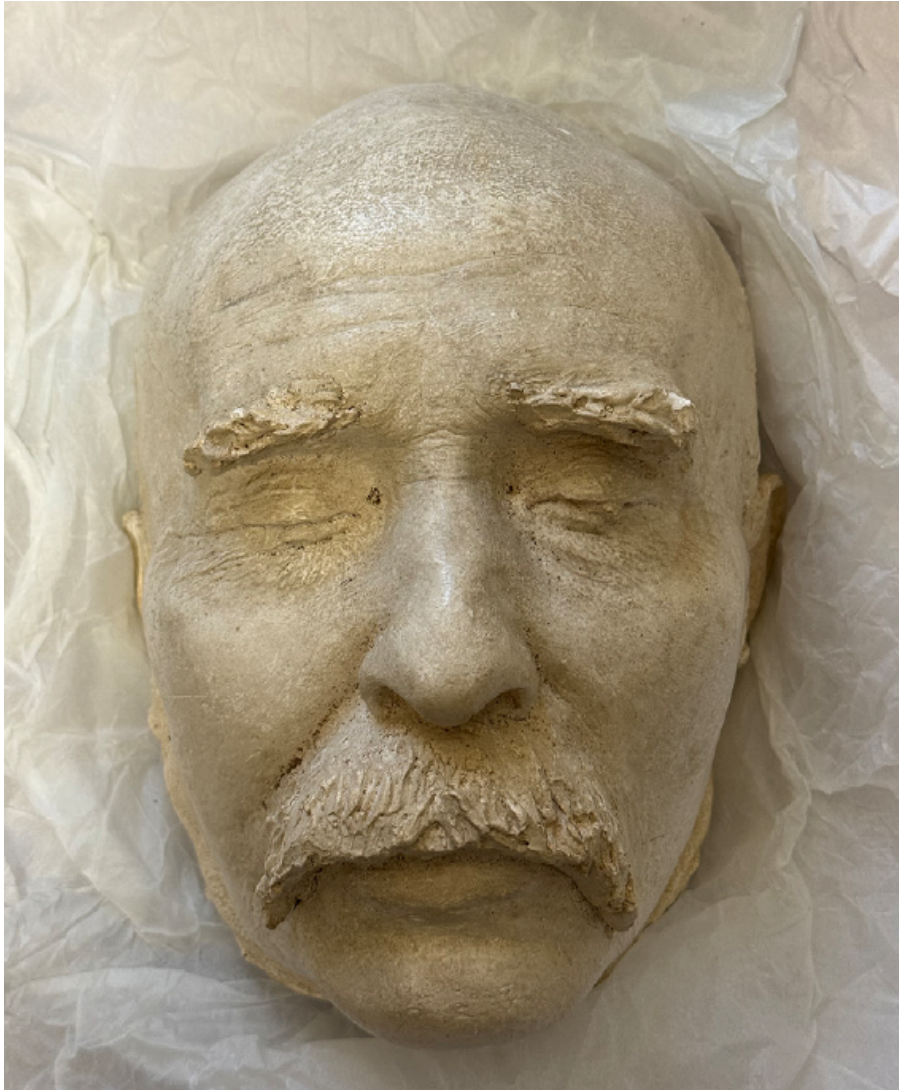
We therefore invite you to **add articles related to iconodiagnosis**, and initially to

THE PAINTING of the month



Death mask of
Georges Clemenceau (1841–1929)
known as “the Tiger,” Prime Minister of France during the First World War.

"A death mask is like the ghost of a person."

A **death mask** is a three-dimensional reproduction of a deceased person's face that faithfully preserves their features. It can be described as the “ghost” or physical imprint of the individual, allowing the deceased's visage to be “presented” across time as a tangible witness of their appearance.

ICONODIAGNOSIS on DEATH MASK

Iconodiagnostics are often associated with paintings or sculptures, but **death masks** also reveal valuable clinical signs. The **death mask of Georges Clemenceau (1841–1929)**, a statesman nicknamed “*The Tiger*” and trained physician, shows the **Frank sign**. At 88 years old, this bilateral earlobe crease reflects a high cardiovascular risk profile, making the mask a true “**frozen patient**”, useful for learning and practicing medical semiology.

What?

How?

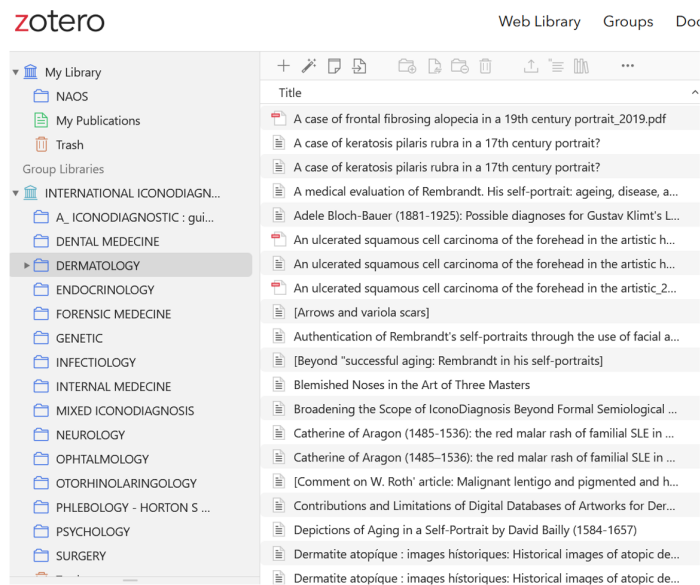

Members may access and enrich the database **at any time**, provided they are up to date with their membership fees, allowing the resource to evolve continuously as new publications and observations emerge.



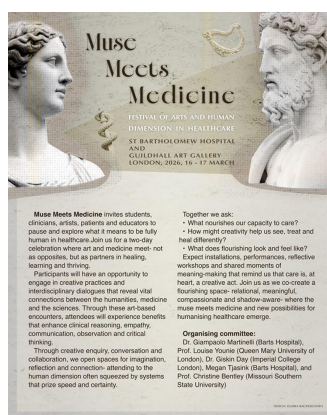

Dermatological Iconodiagnosis on a Tapestry:

A Rare Case Report

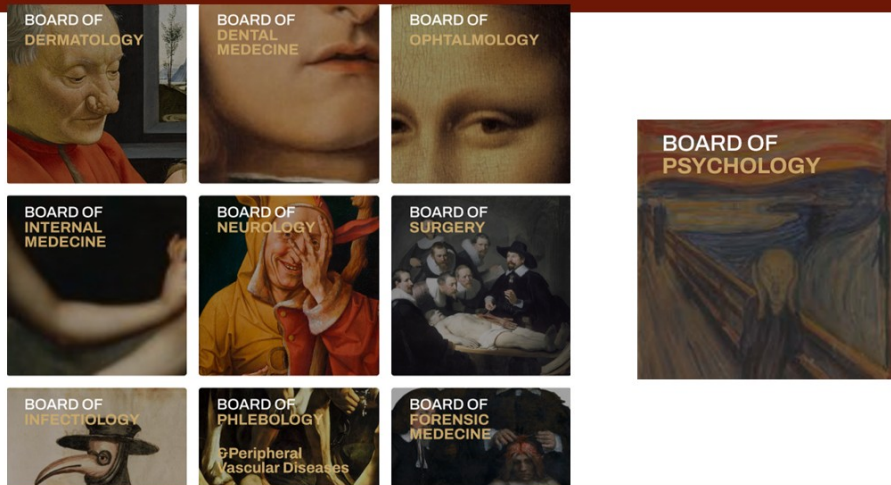
An example of the collaborative work of ISI Dermatological Board under the lead of Dr B. Hillion, Paris, France

The Grape Harvest (Les Vendanges), 16th-century tapestry, Musée de Cluny, Paris, France (Inv. Cl. 21541).

A male grape harvester is depicted with a well-circumscribed papulonodular lesion on the left zygomatic region. Because of the limited resolution inherent to the tapestry medium, a precise diagnosis cannot be established. Differential diagnoses include a melanocytic nevus, sebaceous cyst, seborrheic keratosis, viral wart, basal cell carcinoma, or squamous cell carcinoma. Prominent centrofacial erythematous streaks are also visible and may suggest a predisposition to rosacea. In addition, a second harvester, represented within the wooden vat, appears to display a dermal nevus on the cheek. These observations were independently noted by dermatologists **Brigitte Hillion, Massimo Papi, and Nicolas Kluger**. The limitations imposed by the textile support preclude a more refined morphological assessment.

ISI Iconodiagnosis Boards by Specialty

We would like to remind all members that the ISI Iconodiagnosis initiative is structured around several specialty-based expert boards, each contributing its own perspective and expertise to the interpretation of visual and iconographic material.

Each board plays a key role in the collaborative process, from the collection of cases to their scientific discussion and validation. The Dermatology Board currently serves as the pilot example of this organization.

Within this framework, **each board leader has the opportunity to actively disseminate the ISI mobile application within their own professional network and specialty environment. This local diffusion is essential to stimulate participation, encourage case submission, and ensure a continuous flow of visual material into the system.**

Once cases are submitted through the application, they are systematically collected and centralized, allowing for structured review and collaborative analysis by the relevant expert board. This process ensures both rapid data acquisition and high-level interdisciplinary interpretation.

Through this dynamic workflow—local activation, case submission, centralized collection, and collective expert analysis—the ISI aims to build a robust and evolving global platform for iconodiagnosis across specialties.

PSYCHOLOGICAL ICONODIAGNOSIS

This study, conducted by ISI (International Society of Iconodiagnosis) in collaboration with SiitACT (**Interdisciplinary & international society of Touch**), investigates the representation of touch in painting through the lens of psychological iconodiagnosis. It aims to explore whether artworks can be analyzed as “clinical-like” visual cases, focusing on the affective and symbolic meaning of gestures, postures, and gazes.

A representative corpus of Virgin and Child paintings from different historical periods was analyzed by a psychologist-psychoanalyst in collaboration with an art historian. This led to the development of a typology of tactile gestures (holding, presenting, caressing, intertwining) and to the study of their evolution from Byzantine hieratic conventions to the more expressive and humanized interactions of Renaissance and Baroque art.

Results show clear historical variations: Byzantine works are characterized by symbolic, low-reciprocity gestures, whereas later periods exhibit increased emotional expressivity, bodily interaction, and relational dynamics. A standardized scoring system (1–10) was introduced to quantify posture and gaze (5 points each), enabling comparative analysis across artworks. Using this framework, Peter Paul Rubens’ *Virgin and Child Surrounded by the Holy Innocents* (1618, Louvre Museum) achieved the highest affective touch score (9/10).

In conclusion, **psychological iconodiagnosis offers a promising interpretative framework for analyzing visual expressions of affect. However, caution is required in religious iconography, where conventions may override psychological expression.** The approach may be particularly relevant for secular

imagery such as portraits, and provides both an analytical tool and a means of enhancing visual literacy.

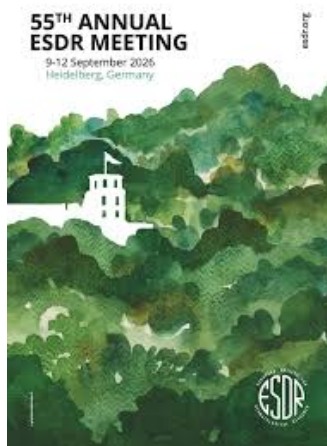

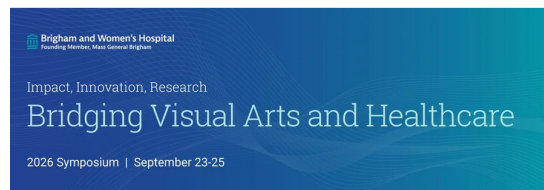
